Well-dressed: James Maina Mwangi of Nairobi, Kenya, came from a poor family and didn't have very many clothes as a child. Others feature swirls of food-coloured dough strands or shapes that are formed into unbelievable patterns. The resulting pies are almost too incredible to eat!

## Did You Know...




