Vintage look: Mila Povoroznyuk, a young woman from Vinnytsia, Ukraine, has long been interested in women's clothing from the late 1800s and early 1900s. Hidden station: The city of Toronto, Ontario (Canada), has a subway system that commuters regularly use. It has a hidden and now-abandoned section that was only used for six months in 1966, called the Lower Bay Station. This sits underneath the Bay Station on the city's Yonge-University subway line. When it was built, planners had hoped to have a useful addition to the line, but instead it became an awkward loop. Now, Lower Bay Station is inaccessible to the public because the entrances have been bricked over. There are unmarked doors to this mysterious underground place, which is occasionally used for training purposes and film shoots.




Did You Know...
