Everybody's Talking

Colourful field: People driving by a field of leeks at night near the town of Lelystad, Netherlands, have been known to stop and gawk. This is not because leeks are an amazing vegetable, but because the field is glowing with blue, red, and purple light. The ultraviolet glow comes from a lighting system designed by Dutch artist Daan Roosegaarde. In addition to being beautiful, the project, called GROW, has a practical purpose: the artist and his team are experimenting with light to see how different wavelengths can enhance plant growth.

Airport home: For three months, the O'Hare International Airport in Chicago, Illinois (U.S.), became the unauthorized home of a man named Aditya Singh. Apparently, the trespasser didn't want to get on a plane to go back to his home state of California. 




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
