### Everybody's Talking

Cowboy hat: An armed thief in Monterrey, Nuevo León, Mexico, got quite a bit more than he expected while attempting to rob a neighbourhood butcher shop. He entered the store, pointing his pistol at the clerk. However, distracted by a customer, he turned his head in her direction. That was just enough time for a gentleman in a cowboy hat to wrestle the robber, who dropped the gun. From the back of the store, a butcher ran over, scooped up the gun, and took it away. Another butcher helped the man in the cowboy hat keep the thief under control. Meanwhile, the clerk had called police, who soon arrived and arrested the robber.

**Town monument:** Someone traveling around Australia might want to stop in Gundagai, a small town about halfway between Sydney and Melbourne. Located here is a famous pioneer monument called "Dog on the Tucker Box." In Australia, a lunchbox is called a tucker box, which the monument depicts. Erected in 1932, the monument was inspired by a poem about "Bullocky Bill," a fictional bullock driver - one of the men who, in pioneer days, drove wagons pulled by oxen. Before railroads, bullock carts hauled building materials, food, and supplies to remote areas of the country. Bullocky Bill's team got bogged down at a creek. To make matters worse, his dog sat upon his tucker box, amusing the other drivers.

Bear sighting: For a close-up look at wild polar bears, take a trip to Churchill, a remote town on Hudson Bay in Manitoba (Canada). Known as the Polar Bear Capital of the World, it is on the animals' migration route to hunt for seals. Depending on the season, anywhere from 800 to 10,000 bears live in the area. Therefore, town folk must stay vigilant. A polar bear patrol program captures errant bears and takes them to a holding facility in an old airplane hangar that some call Bear Jail, until they are released in a location far away. Tourists wanting a glimpse of these magnificent creatures can go on guided tours in large, high tundra vehicles.

Haystack curiosity: When many people think of haystacks, what probably comes to mind is a field full of big piles of hay, or perhaps round bales of the stuff piled up in rows. A region in India uses a different approach. In Rishikesh, in the northern part of the country near the Himalayas, hay left on the ground doesn't dry very well because the area gets so much rain. To lift the hay up from the waterlogged ground, the people in this region make their haystacks in the branches of trees, letting the hay stay reasonably dry. In Rishikesh, it's common to see mounds of hay way up in the branches of trees in villages and fields, and along roadways.






