Locked-up thief: Jitendra Kumar-Sas, a clerk in a cell phone store in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania (U.S.), was going about his daily business when a customer entered, approached him aggressively, and ordered him to hand over all the money in the till. Kumar-Sas kept his cool, explained that there was no cash in the till, and said he would get some from another employee. The robber agreed to wait, which was a mistake, because the smart clerk left the store and locked the man inside. Police were called and managed to get the thief to surrender, but they credited Kimar-Sas for his calm reaction to the situation.

Southern train: Anyone who plans to visit the southern tip of South America will want to include the city of Ushuaia, Argentina. Located on the Isla Grande de Tierra del Fuego, it is known as the southernmost city in the world. The beautiful spot is backed by mountains and fronted by water. Local industries include sheep farming, fishing, lumber, and tourism. One attraction is the Southern Fuegian Railway, a steam train that tourists can take to travel along the Pico Valley. In the 19th century, the railway transported wood from the surrounding forests to be used for heating and cooking.

Potato namesake: A Copenhagen, Denmark, neighbourhood is named after what once lay under the ground: potatoes. Called Kartoffelrækkerne, which means "Potato Row," this area was named for the crop grown on the land in the 1800s. Living conditions in the city were poor at the time, so a decision was made in the 1870s to build three-story, connected homes on the land to house factory workers, one family on each floor. By the 1970s, these homes were slated to be torn down, but residents opposed this. Instead, each home was renovated into a single-family dwelling. Today, the homes on Potato Row command high prices.

Elderly climber: People who are retired and in their 70s, and who have always dreamed of climbing a mountain, could take some inspiration from Arthur Muir. The Northbrook, Illinois (U.S.), man summited Mount Everest. He is the oldest American ever to do so. Although aware of mountain climbing since he was a teenager, he never learned more about it or actually tried it when he was younger. But after he retired at the age of 68, he started to train. He attempted to climb the world's tallest peak in 2019, but an ankle injury stopped him. Therefore, it was a sweet success when, on his second attempt, he made it to the top with a team of mountaineers.







Did You Know...
