Grilled gold: If a grilled cheese sandwich needs to be ordered two days in advance, chances are good that it's not a normal grilled cheese sandwich. A restaurant in New York City (U.S.) called Serendipity 3 sells its "Quintessential Grilled Cheese Sandwich" for a whopping \$214 (USD). The reason for the high price is the amazing ingredients in what otherwise would be standard fare at a lunch joint. The restaurant uses bread that has champagne and edible gold flakes baked into it. The cheese is a rare Italian type called caciocavallo podolico, which is savory and complex. The dipping sauce served with the sandwich is South African Lobster Tomato Bisque. Mmmm!

Art alternative: A business in Japan lets people rent paintings for as long or short a period as desired. Called Casie, the service has become popular, especially for people who cannot afford to buy expensive works of art. Instead, they can pay by the month to have a painting in their home or office, and they can change it when they get tired of it, or if they want to seasonally alter their décor. The founder of the company, Sho Fujimoto, got the idea from seeing his artist father struggle to make a living selling his art. He figured that by offering paintings for rent, both the renter and the artist would benefit. Casie delivers the paintings to the renter's doorstep.

Not just a babysitter: Parents who want to hire a nanny to look after their children might want to consider a graduate of Norland College in Bath, England. One word of warning: these nannies cost a lot of money—somewhere in the vicinity of £78,000 or more per year—because of the special training they receive. Norland College began in the late 1800s, at a time when there was little to no official training for childcare providers. The high-quality education continues today; graduates are capable of teaching manners, various languages, and athletic pursuits, and they do all this with loving affection, in a fair, firm way. Norland nannies often find jobs with wealthy, well-known families.

Clear and blue: Anyone who wants to visit a lake with clear water should consider New Zealand's Blue Lake. Located in the Nelson Lakes National Park conservation area on the country's South Island, Blue Lake is said to have the clearest water of any freshwater lake in the world. The Maori name is Rotomairewhenua, meaning "Lake of Peaceful Lands." Its spring-fed water is naturally filtered through a dam formed by a landslide, so particles suspended in the water get filtered out as they pass through. Like other mountain lakes with clear water, this one has a beautiful blue hue, hence its English name.






