



Star-shaped sand: A particular beach in Japan looks like any other beach in the country, but this one is special to those who look closely at the sand. The beach is called Hoshizuna-no-Hama, which means "Sand in the Shape of a Star." That is exactly the situation in this little slice of paradise, located on Iriomote, an island in Okinawa prefecture. The five- or six-point grains are not really sand; they are the exoskeletons of a small organism that once lived on the ocean floor. Ocean currents bring these tiny bits of shell ashore, mixing them with the "normal" sand on the beach.

Leaning tree: A tall tree native to New Caledonia in the South Pacific is called the Cook pine (Araucaria columnaris). Due to cultivation, these trees grow in other temperate areas of the world. An interesting phenomenon is associated with them: the trees north of the equator lean south, and those south of the equator lean north. Not only that, but the farther away from the equator they are, the more acute the angle. Trees that lean usually do so because of environmental factors, such as wind or light availability. But this is not the case with Cook pines. Scientists have not been able to explain why Cook pines exhibit this distinctive peculiarity.

Mountain lake: The deepest lake in the United States is Crater Lake, located in Crater Lake National Park in the state of Oregon. This body of water is interesting because at one time, it was the top of the volcanic Mount Mazama. About 7,700 years ago, the volcano erupted and the mountain collapsed inward, forming a lake that is 1,943 feet (592 metres) deep. The clear and deep blue water has accumulated through centuries of snow and rain, attracting visitors to view its beauty during all seasons. Crater Lake rarely freezes over, even during the cold and snowy Oregon winters. In the lake sits Wizard Island, which grew from numerous volcanic eruptions over the centuries.

Grassy hill: Icelandic artist Olof Nordal had a unique vision for a work of art. He designed and built a dome-shaped hill known as Thufa. The grass-covered hill has been sitting near the old hharbour in Iceland's capital city of Reykjavik since 2013. Thufa is made of over 4,000 tonnes of gravel and stands about eight metres (26 feet) high. The artist paid tribute to the history of the country by placing an Icelandic fishing hut on top. This type of hut is important to the country's tradition of hanging salted fish to dry. Visitors can walk a spiral path to the top, and from there they can admire views of both the city and fjords.




