### Everybody's Talking

Special date: August 25 has become a huge celebration day for the Lammert family of Oviedo, Florida (U.S.). That's because the three children of the family-sisters Sophia, Giuliana, and Miawere all born on that day, three years apart (2015, 2018, and 2021). Parents Kristin and Nick Lammert were amazed when their first two daughters' births landed on that date, but with Mia's due date being September 8, they didn't think it would happen again. But due to some complications in the pregnancy, Mia arrived two weeks early. Having three children in the same family sharing the same birthday is a very rare occurrence.

Old bird: A very old bird likes to fly back to her nest on Midway Atoll in the Hawaiian archipelago to lay her eggs and raise her young. The bird's name is Wisdom, and she is a Laysan albatross who is approximately 70 years old. She is well known by presentday biologists, whose predecessors banded her in 1956. Wisdom has had the same mate, Akeakamai, for the past 10 or 11 years, and the pair has become parents a few times. They take turns with their duties, with one keeping the nest warm while the other flies many miles during outings in search of food. Wisdom is thought to be the oldest wild bird in the world.

A little late: What if you feel ill, take a nap, and wake up hungry, but it's closing time at your favourite restaurant? This happened to an Australian man, so when he placed an online order for fettuccine carbonara, he explained why he was ordering so late. He said he wouldn't mind if the restaurant canceled his order so the staff could close up. His kindness did not go unnoticed. Not only did the restaurant fill and deliver his order, it arrived with a handwritten note assuring him that the staff didn't mind preparing his food. On top of that, they included free garlic bread, hoping it would help him feel better.

Human power: A man from England named Jason Lewis was the first person to circumnavigate the world without using any kind of non-human power, not even the wind in a sail. He began in 1994, and the trek took him 13 years. First, he and a friend named Stevie Smith (who later dropped out) bicycled through Europe. To cross the Atlantic, they used a custom-made pedal boat with a sleeping compartment. Other methods of transportation included roller blades, a kayak, and foot power when hiking and walking. Lewis is planning another trip with his wife Tammie, to circumnavigate the United Kingdom and Ireland using only human power.


