

Everybody's Talking

Old mine: A spooky but intriguing place can be found in an isolated part of northeast Ireland. It is the remains of the onceactive Benbulben Barite mine, which was in operation from the late 1800s to 1979. Barite (which also is called baryte) is a mineral that has many uses in a number of industries, such as aggregate in cement and as an aid in taking gastrointestinal x-rays. Today, the mine's buildings are gone, but many pylons, wire ropes, and wooden planks remain on the site. The mine is dangerous and is on private property, so anyone who wishes to visit needs to obtain permission from the owner.

Colourful addition: Gardeners wanting to spruce up their flower beds with some startling colours might want to look into Brassica oleracea, ornamental cabbage and kale. That's right, these vegetables are not just for eating. The most common colours for these plants are purple, white, and pink, and all three might be layered throughout the leaves in one cabbage or kale plant. The leaves of ornamental cabbage are flat, while in the ornamental kale they are frilly or ruffled. They are good plants to grow in cooler areas because they can survive temperatures well below freezing.

Wild race: A mountain biking race like no other has been taking place in France each year since 1995. It's called "Megavalanche" and requires contestants to race 2,600 metres (8,530 feet) down a glacier called Pic Blanc. What makes this race stand out is the mass start: about 2,000 riders all begin at the same time at the top. racing down, virtually out of control, at speeds of up to 120 kph (75 mph). The route is slushy and at some points riders actually have to touch their feet to the ground to keep from falling. All the while, helicopters are buzzing overhead and loud music plays, adding to the electric atmosphere.

Name calling: What's in a name? In the case of a young Indonesian boy from South Sumatra, it's his father's penchant for crossword puzzles and his love of the English alphabet. That's why the father, Zulfahmi, decided on "ABCDEF GHIJK" as a name for his son. As the child grew and started school, his friends laughed at him, but today he actually likes his unusual name. Day to day, he is known by the nickname "Adef." Luckily for Adef's two younger brothers, someone in the family must have objected: they are named Ammar and Attar, but Zulfahmi reportedly had wanted to name them "NOPQ RSTUV" and "XYZ."


