Kitty lit: There is nothing like cuddling up with a book—and a cat! That's what visitors to Mon Chat Pitre in Aix-en-Provence, France, can do. It's a bookstore owned by Solène Chavanne and Jean-Philippe Doux, who wanted to design a comforting atmosphere for customers. They brought six kitties from a local animal shelter and provided them with space to roam, a private room to rest, and lots of social interaction with customers. While the store's six cats are not available for new homes (because now they belong to Chavanne and Doux!), the store owners hope that the presence of the felines will encourage others to rescue cats from local shelters.

Bicycle culture: Beginning in the 1970s, kids in Japan began to partake in an interesting hobby called dekochari, which entails elaborately decorating their bicycles. The practice stems from a hobby that was common among adults at the time called dekotora, which means decorating one's truck. She has settled back in well, with her tail constantly wagging, and her owners have found good homes for her offspring.




