Lonely house: On a rocky outcrop high in the mountains in Italy, a structure has become known as "the world's loneliest house." Called Buffa di Perrero, it is in the Dolomite Mountains on Monte Cristallo. The brick dwelling, with windows, two doors, and a slanted roof, is embedded on a ledge nearly 3,000 metres (over 9,000 feet) above sea level. Italian soldiers are thought to have built the house during World War I as a place to hide and rest. To reach it, visitors must travel on the Via Ferrata Ivano Dibona ("iron path"), which consists of steel ladders and cables. For the original builders, getting materials up the mountain would have been quite a feat.

Cow virtual reality: Virtual reality (VR) headsets aren't just for people to use to experience simulated scenes. Cows can use them, too! Izzet Kocak, a farmer from Aksaray, Turkey, wanted to encourage his cows to produce more milk in the winter, when they are cooped up in a barn. He used technology developed by veterinarians that fits VR headsets to the animals and plays scenes of green pastures. A study conducted on this unique idea showed that the cows grew calmer and less stressed. Kocak tested the devices with two cows in his herd and found that with the VR goggles they did, indeed, produce more milk.

Dancing driver: A bus driver in Orlando, Florida (U.S.), knows how to bring joy to one little girl. Mom Brette-Ashley Schmitt of Rochester, New York, was on vacation with her family, including her young daughter Emerson. As their bus arrived at their stop, Emerson's favourite song, Taylor Swift's "Shake if Off," was playing through the public address system. Excitedly, she told the driver she loved the song and started dancing. Despite what was probably a busy schedule, the driver chose to enjoy the moment; he turned up the volume and started dancing in his seat, smiling and laughing along with Emerson. Schmitt was thankful to the driver for taking the extra time to make her daughter smile.

Fingerprint island: Baljenac (or Bavljenac) Island is a fingertipshaped island in the Adriatic Sea off Croatia's coast. The island also looks like a fingerprint when viewed from above. That's because this 0.14-square-kilometre (0.09-square-mile) island has over 23 kilometres (14 miles) of waist-high walls made of piled-up rocks. From the air, the long rows of walls look like the labyrinth of ridges on a fingerprint. The walls protect crops from the high winds common in the area. No one lives on the island, and farmers come from Kaprije, another island nearby, to plant the crops. Most likely, the walls have been there since at least the 19th century.
