Stone carver: A fellow named Ganauri Paswan, who lives in the village of Jaru Banwariya in northern India, has a heart of gold, as well as unending patience to complete a task. He wanted everyone, regardless of their mobility issues, to be able to walk up a 457-metre (1,500-ft.) rocky mountainside to a temple at the top. Using only rudimentary tools like a chisel and hammer, he carved 400 steps. It took him eight years to complete the job, which he did on a volunteer basis. He often worked alone, but sometimes family members and friends would join him for a day of work. To carve the steps, he used stones he found on the mountain.

Hot water: Ever dream of sitting in a hot tub while in the middle of a lake? A Spacruzzi is a hot tub boat made in the United States by a company of the same name. Shaped like a teardrop, the watercraft has seats, just like a normal hot tub, and steamy water is regulated through a heating and filtration system. A small motor allows users to cruise around their chosen lake for a few hours. The expensive contraption, which starts at \$48,900 (USD), also boasts a gas fireplace, and buyers can opt for extras, such as underwater lighting. The unit is small enough to be easily transported and launched. What an experience!

Barcode tattoo: A man from Taiwan was tired of pulling his cell phone from his pocket to make payments by showing the barcode on his transaction app. So he got a tattoo of the barcode. Now he presents his arm and lets the cashier scan the code to pay for goods. Luckily, he found a talented tattoo artist for the job; one small slip up, such as too much space between bars or one bar that was too thin or thick, would have made the code unusable. The tattoo works, at least for now. In time, it may fade and he may need to have touch-ups done.

Looking good: Fashion designers around the world are finding a new market for their designs: hospitals or, more precisely, the patients in hospitals. Who wants to be in a healthcare facility, already feeling unwell, and then look even worse in a traditional, baggy hospital gown that ties at the back? No one! So clothing makers have started crafting stylish and functional gowns using soft, comfortable fabric, nice colours, and utilitarian features, such as pockets. The idea is that people who are ill should not also have to think about how they are dressed. Plus, a nice-looking gown may serve to lift spirits and provide a small bit of dignity.





Did You Know...


