











Ice cream paradise: In Cuba, both tourists and locals can indulge in ice cream to their hearts' content, and for very little cost, when they visit Parque Coppelia in Havana. Also known as la catedral de helado (the ice cream cathedral), this venue serves an astounding 30,000 ice cream lovers per day. At any one time, there could be 600 people of all ages clamouring for a serving of the sweet treat. The world's largest ice cream pavilion, Parque Coppelia is so big that it takes up a whole city block. For Cubans, going to this place is a tradition. People have been eating ice cream there since it was built in 1966.

Runway ruckus: Flight delays most often are caused by weather or mechanical problems. But at New Zealand's Wellington International Airport, neither of those scenarios was the reason an Air Chathams flight couldn't take off as planned. The delay was because airport staff members were scrambling to get a baby penguin off the runway.
